## Hair salon idea a cut above in H.K. contest

Rikkyo University junior Koki Matsumura won the Hong Kong Cup All Japan University Student Ambassadors English Program in Tokyo on Saturday, presenting a business plan to open a hair salon in Hong Kong featuring high-quality Japanese service.

Held this year for the eighth time, the contest chooses students who can serve as a bridge between Hong Kong and Japan. Competitors are required to present their ideas, with visual aids, on one of three designated topics in the fields of business, tourism and culture.

In his presentation, Matsumura said the high standard of service at Japanese hair salons is well known, just like its food and tourism. Explaining that Japanese hair salons in Hong Kong are expensive and outdated due to the fact that many stylists are out of touch with the latest Japanese trends, he proposed bringing young trainee stylists from beauty schools in Japan to Hong Kong on internships.

Matsumura stressed that these students would bring the latest trends from Japan to the Hong Kong salon every quarter or school year, meaning it could offer up-to-date styles at inexpensive prices.

"Sports Innovation in Hong Kong." He proposed operating indoor sports facilities in Hong Kong using virtual reality technology from Japan.

The second runner-up was Kyo Hakugyoku, a senior at Musashino University. The Fighting Spirit Prize went to Yu Iwama, a junior at Tokyo Medical University, and Megumi Ikeda, a sophomore at Aoyama Gakuin University.

The top five winners will become student ambassadors and were awarded a study tour to Hong Kong.

Saturday's final round was held at KDDI Hall in Chiyoda Ward, Tokyo, with 15 university students selected from 97 participants. They competed against each other on topics including "What kind of business would you like to set up in Hong Kong?"

The contest was organized by the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office (Tokyo) and The Japan News, with support from the Foreign Ministry; the Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology Ministry; and The Yomiuri Shimbun.
